Please keep an eye out for a vehicle that was stolen from a farm just outside of Newsham.

The yellow Gehl Bobcat Skidsteer was stolen from a farm on Dyson Lane, Newsham near to the A66 overnight between the 6th and 7th October 2024.

This vehicle was taken with the bucket still attached to the front and is similar to the one pictured below.

This is one of three skid steers that have been stolen from Richmondshire in the last few days. It is clear that criminals are targeting this specific type of machinery, and due to this I would like to take this opportunity to ask that any farmers or construction companies that have this type of machinery across Richmondshire to ensure that they are locked away and secured.



Hate Crime Awareness Week 14-19th October 2024

In most crimes it is something the victim has in their possession or control that motivates the offender to commit the crime. With hate crime it is 'who' the victim is, or 'what' the victim appears to be that motivates the offender to commit the crime.

A hate crime is defined as 'Any criminal offence which is perceived by the victim or any other person, to be motivated by hostility or prejudice based on a person's race or perceived race; religion or perceived religion; sexual orientation or perceived sexual orientation; disability or perceived disability and any crime motivated by hostility or prejudice against a person who is transgender or perceived to be transgender.'

A hate incident is any incident which the victim, or anyone else, thinks is based on someone's prejudice towards them because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender.

Evidence of the hate element is not a requirement. You do not need to personally perceive the incident to be hate related. It would be enough if another person, a witness or even a police officer thought that the incident was hate related.

Before you travel, you should:

- Think about whether your journey is necessary
- Check the latest weather forecast
- Plan to use main roads and check the gritting routes even if it puts a few miles onto your journey, but remember that they may still be icy
- Check the live weather cameras for an idea of the conditions
- Allow extra time
- Ensure you have glasses to the correct prescription
- Tell someone your plans
- Check whether you need breakdown or recovery insurance
- Check your tyre pressure and tread depth, and your spare tyre
- Check your vehicle's lights are working and clean
- Check your wipers, and that you have screen wash containing anti-freeze
- Check that your car battery is in good condition and fully charged
- Check your windows and mirrors are clear of ice and condensation
- Check hat your car's windscreen is covered with a blanket overnight
